9th - 12th	Introduction to Entrepreneurship: Build & Launch Your Own Business	<p>This exciting and interactive course introduces high school students to the fundamentals of entrepreneurship. Over 30 weeks, students will learn how to develop a business idea, create a product, market it online, and manage the financial aspects of running a business. The course culminates in a hands-on project where students will design, produce, and sell their own product. Key topics include business planning, online marketing, budgeting, inventory management, and customer service email marketing. Students will leave the course equipped with real-world skills and confidence to pursue entrepreneurial ventures in the future.</p> <p>Homework: Students can expect 2-3 hours of homework per week. Assignments include market research, developing parts of a business plan, creating marketing materials, and preparing for the final product launch. Larger projects and deadlines will be provided in writing to allow for time management.</p> <p>Prerequisites: Students should have basic computer skills (e.g., navigating the internet, using word processing tools, have a gmail account) and be able to complete independent research. All Lessons will be divided into two-week segments. Reading the text and notebook assignments should be done at home. We will cover experiments, "Try This", and data recording in class. We will cover Experiments, "Explore More" and data recording in class. Students will communicate their findings and share notebook activities in class. 8th - 12th	Adventures in Earth & Space Science	<p>The heavens declare the glory of God! See the Earth as you never have before, and then take a journey through the solar system to visit planets, moons, asteroids, thundering volcanoes and sloshing alien seas. We will learn from other worlds what makes the Earth perfect for life—and how we can care for God's creation. Visit a storm twice as big as the Earth and see mountains frosted in "fool's gold". 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9th - 12th	Berean Builders <i>Discovering Design with Biology Lab</i>	<p>This two-hour class is the lab component of a two-semester high school biology course using the Berean Builders text book <i>Discovering Design with Biology</i> by Dr. Paul Madtes Jr. and Dr. Jay L. Wile. This course is a thorough introduction to how living organisms are designed and classified, how they interact with one another, and how they interact with their physical environment. Throughout the course, your student will see that life is the result of design and that organisms have been given the ability to adapt to their surroundings, as well as learn to identify the problems associated with modern evolutionary thinking.</p> <p>Concepts covered include the chemical processes for life, the structures of RNA and DNA, and cell design, After a thorough survey of the different kinds of organisms found in nature (archaea, bacteria, protists, fungi, invertebrates, vertebrates, and plants), your student will then learn about ecosystems and the biogeochemical cycles that keep environments hospitable to life. Labs include extracting DNA from fruit, examining the effects of temperature and pH on enzymes, exploring osmosis and diffusion, building a pedigree, culturing bacteria, growing and examining fungi, identifying the stages of mitosis, and analyzing the microscopic structure of plants and animals. There are also four dissection experiments: the earthworm, crayfish, fish, and frog.</p> <p>Homework: Each student should plan on 1-2 hours per week preparing for lab, completing the lab write-ups, and studying for lab quizzes. The structure of class will vary from week to week but may include lecture, additional notes, microscope work, dissection, or some other demonstration or lab activity. In addition, each chapter in the text will take your student about 2 weeks to complete. Students should plan on a few hours per week to read the text, work through the "Comprehension Check" problems, answer the "Review" questions, and do the chapter tests. This work is done under the guidance and supervision of a parent. Parent responsibility will include monitoring and grading all the work from the text ("Comprehension Check" and "Review" questions) and proctoring and grading the chapter tests. I will grade lab notebooks, lab write-ups, and lab quizzes. My recommendation is that 1. Homework and assignments; 2. Chapter Tests; and 3. Lab be weighted 1/3 each of total course grade.</p> <p>Prerequisites: MS general science class and/or life science class. 10th - 12th	Apologia <i>Exploring Creation with Physics Lab</i>	<p>Exploring Creation with Physics curriculum, 2nd Edition is designed to provide students with a foundational understanding of physics while also preparing them for college-level physics and the ACT. Because the science of physics is an attempt to explain everything observed in nature, this text is an overview of the advances made over the last three thousand years! When your student completes Apologia's physics course, your student will be able to relate velocity, acceleration, time, and displacement, use mathematical equations for one-dimensional motion, understand and apply Newton's Laws, and be able to see the strong connection between math and science.</p> <p>Homework: Students should plan on about 5 hours per week to write lab reports and to prepare for class, as well as to read all the material in the textbook, complete homework, and to take the tests provided by the curriculum.</p> <p>Prerequisites: Algebra 2 (can be taken concurrently) Class supplies: Apologia <i>Exploring Creation with Physics, Ed.2</i> text, a 3-ring binder with minimum of 4 dividers and loose-leaf paper, pencils, pens, 8 colored pencils, ruler (metric and English), scissors, calculator (smart phone is acceptable), lab coat (or apron), and safety (splash and impact resistant) goggles.</p>	Candace Dixon	<p>\$470/Year Tuition \$30 Material Fee \$65 Credo Registration Fee</p>

1st - 5th	<i>Benjamin West and His Cat Grimalkin</i>	<p>This delightful children's biography by famed author, Marguerite Henry, is based on the life of the 18th century Benjamin West, the father of American painting. Raised a Quaker in the colony of Pennsylvania, young Benjamin was taught how to mix paints by the local Delaware Indians and cut fur off his cat's tail to make paintbrushes. West later studied art in Europe and resided in London, where he cofounded the Royal Academy of Arts. His studio became an art center where he taught three generations of American painters. Though he had much success as an adult, this biography focuses on his childhood.</p> <p>As we read the book in class, children will complete coloring pages, a map of Colonial America, take brief notes about the setting, characters and theme of the book, learn new vocabulary, and complete 6 coordinating arts and crafts lessons. A shadow puppet show script is included in the teacher's guide and we will do this activity as time allows. A brief amount of class time will be spent on William Penn and the history of Colonial Philadelphia. If you are unfamiliar with the book, please check Amazon for reviews. The entire first chapter is included on the website as well.</p> <p>Homework: Homework will only be assigned if we get behind on reading in class. Prerequisites: Reading skills are helpful but not required, as we will be reading the book aloud in class. 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6th - 8th	Tales of Adventure	<p>Using fictional works, combined with the study of biography, students in this year long class will learn about the individuality of nations as they experience life with pirates and knights. We'll begin with <i>Treasure Island</i>, an exciting and treacherous quest, imaginative and full of moral lessons for young people. Robert Louis Stevenson stated that the story was inspired by a detailed map he drew from his imagination. Published in the 1880s, it was popular among children and adults alike. Even in Stevenson's time, pirates were not at all common, so he set his story in the 1700s, and used strange words to give the narrative an archaic feel. Second semester's focus will be on the legends of Scotland as students are introduced to Walter Scott, the father of historical fiction. <i>Sir Walter Scott: Wizard of the North</i>, is an accurately researched biography and an enjoyable read, revealing the character of Scott as he faces ill health and becomes an author. Following the biographical study we'll read an abridged version of one of his best works. Set in England just after the Third Crusade, <i>Ivanhoe</i> is the tale of Wilfred, a young Saxon knight, and his love for the royal princess Rowena. With his father against their union, Wilfred embarks on a series of adventures to prove his worth, finding himself in conflict against the Normans and the Templars and allied with such larger-than-life figures as Robin Hood and Richard the Lion-heart. A timeless story of courage, chivalry, and courtly love, <i>Ivanhoe</i> is a grand epic.</p> <p>Students in this class will learn the elements of classic literature: plot, setting, characterization, style of the author, and theme. In <i>Treasure Island</i>, Stevenson writes sound into the text, and we will examine his use of words to create pictures for the reader. As we study we will create a treasure map, make a spyglass, and label the parts of a ship. The second semester will include learning the geography of England and Scotland, mapping "Ivanhoe" land, and completing related art projects. Notes will be taken both semesters to record significant plot, setting, and character elements, and writing assignments will be used to assess student learning.</p> <p>Homework: Homework may be as much as one hour a week, but will not exceed 90 minutes. It will include reading and some writing assignments that may require student research.</p> <p>Prerequisites: Students should be good readers. <i>Ivanhoe</i>, taught in the second semester, is the most challenging text we will use.</p> <p>Class supplies: Three-ring notebook, colored pencils or markers, pencil, eraser, and a copy of each of the following books: Unabridged version of <i>Treasure Island</i> by Robert Louis Stevenson, ISBN-10: 1789433878, ISBN-13: 978-1789433876, <i>Sir Walter Scott: Wizard of the North</i> by Pearle Henriksen Schultz, available from The Foundation for American Christian Education, or from Amazon. ISBN: 978-1-935851-14-1. Library copies are also acceptable. <i>Ivanhoe</i> by Sir Walter Scott and edited by Lucile and Hal Waldo, is a difficult book to find. 6th - 8th	Writing with <i>Lost Tools of Writing</i>	<p>This engaging and interactive writing course is designed to help middle school students develop strong persuasive writing skills using the <i>Lost Tools of Writing</i> curriculum. Students will refine their ability to think critically, organize their thoughts, and construct well-reasoned arguments while exploring classic literature. Each unit will focus on a different novel, guiding students through the process of crafting persuasive essays based on themes and moral dilemmas presented in the readings. By the end of the course, students will have gained confidence in their writing abilities, improved their analytical thinking, and mastered the foundational tools for clear and effective communication.</p> <p>Students will read <i>The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe</i> by C.S. Lewis; <i>The Sign of the Beaver</i> by Elizabeth George Speare; <i>Carry On, Mr. Bowditch</i> by Jean Lee Latham; <i>Number the Stars</i> by Lois Lowry; <i>The Outsiders</i> by S.E. Hinton; <i>The Witch of Blackbird Pond</i> by Elizabeth George Speare; <i>Call of the Wild</i> by Jack London; <i>Johnny Tremain</i> by Esther Forbes; and <i>Around the World in 80 Days</i> by Jules Verne.</p> <p>Homework: Students should expect around 2-4 hours of homework per week, including reading assignments, ANI charts, essay drafts, and revisions. <i>The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe</i> should be read prior to the first day of class so we can begin the first week. 9th - 12th	World Literature: Exploring Society through Classic Texts	<p>Embark on a literary journey across centuries and continents in this thought-provoking high school World Literature course. Designed for grades 9-12, this class dives deep in the cultural, historical, and societal themes of renowned classics. Students will analyze texts to explore topics like censorship, morality, power, identity, and justice. Through discussions, writing assignments, and projects, students will develop critical thinking and analytical skills, all while gaining a deeper understanding of literature's influence on society. This class is perfect for students who enjoy reading, analyzing and discussing big ideas in literature.</p> <p>Students will read <i>The Killer Angles</i> by Michael Shaara; <i>Uncle Tom's Cabin</i> by Harriet Beecher Stowe; <i>Jane Eyre</i> by Charlotte Bronte; <i>The Yellow Wallpaper</i> by Charlotte Perkins Gilman; <i>The Count of Monte Cristo</i> by Alexandre Dumas; <i>And Then There Were None</i> by Agatha Christie; <i>The Murders in the Rue Morgue</i> by Edgar Allan Poe; <i>Crime and Punishment</i> by Fyodor Dostoevsky; <i>Frankenstein</i> by Mary Shelley; <i>Animal Farm</i> by George Orwell; and <i>The Communist Manifesto</i> by Karl Marx. These novels contain mature themes, so parents are encouraged to read the books and discuss with their students at home.</p> <p>Homework: Students can expect 2-3 hours of homework per week, including reading assignments, journaling, and short essays. Larger projects, such as thematic analyses and/or research papers, will be assigned with ample notice to allow for planning.</p> <p>Prerequisites: Students should be comfortable with high school-level reading and writing. 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9th - 12th	American Literature	<p>Students will read <i>Soldier's Heart</i> by Gary Paulsen and <i>The Red Badge of Courage</i> by Stephen Crane, comparing their depictions of young soldiers in the American Civil War, focusing on themes of innocence, courage, fear, and psychological trauma. In addition, we will focus on some significant battles of the Civil War, First Battle of Bull Run (First Manassas), Second Battle of Bull Run (Second Manassas) and the Battle of Gettysburg.</p> <p>The class is designed to immerse students in the historical and emotional realities of the Civil War through the lens of two young protagonists: Charley Goddard in <i>Soldier's Heart</i> and Henry Fleming in the <i>The Red Badge of Courage</i>. Both novels provide vivid portrayals of youthful idealism shattered by the brutal realities of war, offering a rich foundation for exploring universal human experiences and the psychological toll of combat. 6th - 8th	Principles of Freedom & Economics with <i>The Tuttle Twins</i>	<p>Using <i>The Tuttle Twins</i> book series, we will learn about big concepts with fun and easy stories. Each book in this series focuses on a different aspect of the principles of a free society. This course will help develop critical thinking skills about real-world concepts. We will spend 2 weeks on each book: reading, discussing, and doing fun projects/experiments with a writing assignment per book. 6th - 8th	US History - <i>Stories of America</i>	<p>In class, we will begin with Columbus, the Great Sailor, and explore how the colonies were established following the arrival of the Pilgrims in America. Our journey will include learning about Daniel Boone and his contributions to westward expansion, digging into the causes and effects of the French and Indian War, and studying the American Revolution, the fight for independence and the founding of a new government. We will conclude with Remembering the Alamo, reflecting on its significance in American history and the spirit of those who fought for freedom.</p> <p>Throughout our studies, we will participate in discussions, activities, and reflections to enhance our understanding of these pivotal historical moments. Students will engage in activities like map exploration, character maps, create an interactive timeline highlighting the arrival of the Pilgrims, the establishment of colonies, and key events, draw by hand a map of the original colonies and other added territories and states. Students will participate in role-playing activities, a Patriot vs. Loyalist debate, and create a class newspaper, writing articles covering different events from the time period.</p> <p>Homework: Students can expect up to 1 hour of homework a week. The reading will need to be completed at home along with some project work. 6th - 12th	American Sign Language I	Curriculum based on Start ASL: ASL 1 program, modified to be more user friendly. Vocabulary lists will be learned in class and practiced over two or three week periods. Words will need to be practiced at home in preparation for a conversation quiz. During the second semester, students will be asked to translate Bible verses and present them in class. At the end of each semester students will be asked to give a short presentation based on what they have learned. We will perform a song in Sign Language for showcase each semester which we will learn and practice in class. In addition, online classes are asynchronous, meaning that lectures are pre-recorded so that students are not required to login to the course at a specific time. Instead, there are weekly deadlines in the course that allow students to complete their work when they are able throughout the week.</p> <p>Applications for the spring semester are available. Students may register for courses once their application is accepted. It normally takes 1-2 weeks for a dual enrollment application to be accepted. Registration will be open October 16, 2025 if done through Credo. If registering through Credo, please contact Janean Fischer as soon as possible. Registration opened on October 13th on the CCU website.</p> <p>Online dual enrollment courses through CCU Academy cost \$110 per credit, so most classes are \$330 per course. Spring tuition must be paid by start of classes. Online classes begin January 12, 2026. See the academic calendar here.</p> <p>A Credo parent volunteer, who is the room supervisor, will have everyone in a classroom going through the course together as long as individual assignments are done individually. All classes are from a Christian perspective.</p> <p>To Register with CREDO:</p> <p>Go to the Credo Academy website- click "registration" on the left tabs, then go to "register for classes." The class matrix will come up then you will have the option to sign up for 1, 2, or 3 DE classes:</p> <p>a. Sign up for the 8:30-9:30 Old Testament and/or the 9:30-10:30 General Psychology "in seat" class times (\$35 Credo registration fee) and your student can attend a "class" where they will be with all the other students who signed up. Class time will offer students deadline accountability and a Credo parent volunteer in the room who also has access to the same online class so they can answer questions and help with assignments. That parent monitor will have some access to the CCU professor and will possibly be able to hold class discussions. The parent in the room will have access to the class and should be a great help to the students. The class time will also have dedicated time for them to work on their assignments.</p> <p>b.
